New guidelines for storing dangerous goods

The International Cargo Handling (ICHCA), International Vessel Owners Dangerous Goods Shipping Council (WSC) have for handling dangerous goods.

The runners-up in the virtual awards ceremony, hosted at TT Club's office in London, UK, were PSA International (Video Analytics anti-collision system) and Cargotec Sweden AB (safe container inspection from the underside)



The virtual ceremony was addressed by Heike Deggim, Director of Maritime Safety Division, IMO, and was hosted by ICHCA's CEO Richard Steele. A recording of the whole event will be available shortly on the ICHCA and TT Club's websites.

Their statement reads: "Viking's HydroPen helps address the increasing incidence of fire in containers on board ships at sea. The complexity of the cargoes carried and the

frequent challenge of accessing the containers makes fighting fires most difficult for the first responders, the ship's crew. HydroPen enables such fires to be attended from a safe distance and the judges were particularly impressed by the specific online training that is provided with each unit.

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TT Club's MD, Loss Prevention, Mike Yarwood, said: "It is hugely encouraging to have so many entrants seeking to solve a host of challenges, from the provision of geo-spatial data and predictive maintenance software to technology that measures local climatic conditions. The last two years have been incredibly busy and difficult for all concerned and safety issues have arguably increased significantly. It is good to see that despite these conditions, the industry's commitment to resilience and safety is undiminished."

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Bill Brassington, Chair of the ICHCA Technical Panel, emphasised the role of the partners in organising the Awards and their consistent efforts to improve safety. "In recent years the shipping industry has suffered a number of severe fires originating in containers and the TT Club and ICHCA have been campaigning consistently to reduce these life-threatening events," he highlighted.
